### Abstract

The Holy Qur'an contains numerous texts underscoring the significance of safeguarding lives and property, as exemplified in Surah Al-Baqarah: Verse 195, "And do not throw yourselves into destruction with your own hands," and Surah An-Nisa: Verses 29-30, "And do not kill yourselves." Consequently, the preservation of life and property is an inherent and instinctual concern that applies universally. A secure environment and peaceful atmosphere are crucial for the advancement and development of human societies. Islam, as a religion of peace and harmony, emphasizes the importance of societal peace and security and denounces violence in all its forms for all people.
