emergencies. This work highlights how smart, simple strategies can make education stronger, even

in very difficult times.

Recommendation:

This study offers valuable insights into how grassroots resilience and adaptive strategies can sustain

education during armed conflicts. It is recommended for educators, policymakers, and humanitarian

organizations seeking efficient and scalable solutions for crisis-affected education systems. The

integration of 'Lean thinking' principles presents a novel framework for optimizing limited resources

and fostering community-led educational continuity during emergencies.
