

Evaluating Compensation Structures: Comparing Emergency and Specialized Certificate Holders with Certified Educators

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Abstract

In this regard, the recommendations focus on conditional alignment based on proven competency and mentoring support, alongside differentiated pay advancement structures, while future implications include consideration of retention openings and pathways in teacher hiring, pipeline implementation and outcome data relative to students over the long-term based on certification type.
